




Knitting Mill Apartments Now Open!



DePaul, State, County and local government officials, along with LECESE Construction, SWBR Architects, and financial and community partners announced the opening of DePaul's Knitting Mill Apartments, a 48-apartment, \$17 million affordable housing development in the Village of Perry, New York. More than half of the apartments are reserved for both frail and disabled seniors as well as individuals eligible for on-site supportive services that promote stability, health and independent living.

"We are excited that this adaptive re-use of an important local landmark into a vital and welcome resource will knit an entire neighborhood together," said Village of Perry Mayor Rick Hauser. "It serves as a community model, supports our residents, and helps us to stabilize and restore population."


The new apartments are available to households with incomes at or below 60 percent of the area median income. Thirty-four of the apartments are available to tenants who will have access to supportive services and rent subsidies through the Empire State Supportive Housing Initiative (ESSHI), part



of Governor Cuomo's \$20 billion, five-year housing plan. The plan combats homelessness by building and preserving more than 100,000 units of affordable housing and 6,000 of supportive housing.

The Knitting Mill Apartments are part of the Finger Lakes Forward initiative; increasing access to high quality, supportive and affordable housing helping residents to stay in their community and live independently.

"The Knitting Mill Apartments furthers our commitment to Finger Lakes Forward by providing affordable housing and job training



opportunities," said Governor Andrew M. Cuomo. "These apartments will create safe and stable homes for individuals and families who need them most."

The Knitting Mill Apartments amenities include a community room, lounges, computer labs, laundry rooms, shared outdoor space and office areas. The name pays tribute to the Perry Knitting Company and the building originally known as Mill No. 1, which was erected in 1882. The Perry Knitting Company closed in 1914.

"DePaul's Knitting Mill Apartments have transformed a vacant, historic building in the Village of Perry into 48 affordable and supportive homes," said Homes and Community Renewal

Commissioner RuthAnne Visnauskas. “When we provide individuals with access to services in a caring environment, we can ensure that they remain safely housed and live successful lives.”

Financing for the project includes federal low-income housing tax credits administered through New York State Homes and Community Renewal, which will generate nearly \$11 million in equity as well as funding of approximately \$4.1 million through its Supportive Housing Opportunity Program.

“This investment continues our commitment to add and preserve affordable housing options for New Yorkers,” said Lieutenant Governor Kathy Hochul. “DePaul’s Knitting Mill Apartments in Perry will provide affordable units for residents in addition to supportive services and job training to promote healthy, independent and stable lifestyles. The development is part of our overall efforts to provide high-quality housing and strengthen the economy to keep moving the Finger Lakes Forward.”

The New York State Office of Mental Health will provide \$850,000 in annual services and operating funds to support the 34 ESSHI supportive housing units, in addition to a \$203,000 Program Development Grant. The New York State

Energy Research and Development Authority provided a \$48,000 grant.

“Governor Cuomo’s commitment to supportive housing is providing vulnerable New Yorkers with stable, affordable housing, giving them the opportunity to thrive in their own community,” said Office of Mental Health Commissioner Ann Marie T. Sullivan, M.D. “The 34 supportive units in DePaul’s Knitting Mill Apartments will help people on their road to recovery by giving them the services they need in their very own homes.”

Partners on the project include New York Homes and Community Renewal, New York State Office of Mental Health, New York State Energy Research and Development Authority, DePaul, SWBR Architects, LECESSE Construction, Five Star Bank and Red Stone Equity Partners.

“DePaul is pleased to be a community partner in meeting the need for quality affordable housing options in Wyoming County and throughout New York State,” said DePaul President Mark H. Fuller. “We wish to thank Governor Cuomo and the State for providing DePaul with the funding that has made it possible for us to provide homes for people in need. The DePaul Knitting Mill Apartments are an example of progress and partnership in action.”



DePaul is increasing its ability to better serve even more people in need with updates to several senior living communities and the construction of several new affordable housing and supportive housing programs.

Renovations have begun at a number of DePaul Senior Living Communities. Southfork in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, Wexford House in Denver, North Carolina, Glenwell in Cheektowaga, New York, and Woodcrest Commons in Henrietta, New York are all undergoing general facelifts and improvements including new paint, flooring, lighting and furniture, among other updates. A 20-bed addition will also be constructed at Wexford House and is expected to be complete by fall 2019.

Work continues on DePaul's Apple Blossom Apartments in Cheektowaga, New York. A \$37 million investment will renovate the Old Union Road Campus to provide 110 units of integrated housing for income-eligible tenants. Tenants will have access to on-site support services such as rehabilitation training specifically designed to promote health, wellness and independent living.

Work has begun on the DeWitt Clinton Apartments in Rome, New York. The community will have a total of 80 apartments consisting of a 66-unit apartment building and 14 townhouses for income-eligible tenants and will offer on-site housing specialist support services.

Construction has begun on the Starting Line Apartments in Utica, New York. The community will have a total of 60 units consisting of 54 one-bedroom and six two-bedroom apartments for income-eligible tenants and will offer on-site housing specialist support services and linkages to community services to assist persons in living as independently as possible.

Construction has begun on La Rosa Villas in LeRoy, New York. The project will have a total of 60 units consisting of six studio, 48 one-bedroom and six two-bedroom apartments, and will offer on-site housing specialist support services. This affordable housing community for individuals 55 years old and above is under construction at the site of the former Lapp Lumber Mill on Mill Street.

DePaul looks forward to the completion of these new communities and renovations which will revitalize the community, create jobs, provide homes for many, and most importantly, change lives.

Celebrating Centuries of Wisdom


