Breaking Ground on Rochester View Apartments

Construction began on DePaul's Rochester View Apartments with a groundbreaking on May 15. The community will feature 61 one- and two-bedroom apartments for income-eligible tenants and include enhanced supports to accommodate tenants who may be deaf, hard of hearing or those using American Sign Language. The DePaul Rochester View Apartments will be located on West Henrietta Road in Henrietta, New York, next to Woodcrest Commons, a DePaul Senior Living Community.

"Those of us who get to go home every night take it for granted, but so much happens at home," said State Assembly Majority Leader Joseph Morelle. "So much of our thinking of our families, of our communities

all comes together in our home and when you don't have that opportunity, it's a significant dimension of your life that is challenged."

Completion of the \$17,650,000 project is anticipated for the fall of 2015. Apartments will include open floor plans with high levels of visibility, strategic

lighting, safety lights on the faucet and doorbell, video conferencing and calling, and pillows that vibrate during a fire alarm.

Assemblyman Bronson said Henrietta has one of the largest populations of people who are deaf and hearing-impaired.

"This project is sensitive to their needs and sensitive to the community," he added. "It will not only help with communication issues but other

issues that are unique to this wonderful community."

HALSTEAD SQUARE

Recognized by American Institute of Architects

DePaul's Halstead Square, a 75-unit Single Room Occupancy Program located in Rochester, New York, was recognized by the American Institute of Architects (AIA) with a 2014 AIANYS Excelsior Award for design and professional excellence in publicly-funded buildings in New York state.


SWBR and DePaul re-energized the urban fabric of a former blighted area in Rochester, restoring an 1890s-era convent and converting it to the 14-unit Main Street Apartments, and by maintaining historical elements and materials in the façade of all three buildings on the campus which also includes Halstead Square and the DePaul Brown Street Apartments. Completed in the fall of 2010, Halstead Square includes an urban courtyard, light-filled connected spaces, sculptural artwork and a



living landscaped green wall to create connected areas that foster socialization and way finding.

Halstead Square is being hailed by AIANYS as a "model of excellence for future state-funded building design and professional practice and advocacy."

"SWBR is extremely proud of our continued collaboration and partnership with DePaul and very excited that Halstead Square has been recognized with an Excelsior Award for Public Architecture by the AIA New York State," said SWBR Principal Joe Gibbons. "It is a fitting tribute for an amazing project that has re-energized the Bullshead area of Rochester and served as a catalyst for other exciting developments that continue to strengthen this historic neighborhood."

an artist Coming Into His Own by Marcia Dlutek

On a chilly evening in February, Michael Benvenuti surveyed the crowd in the gallery of the Creative Wellness Coalition, a peer-run service of the Mental Health Association in Rochester. A throng of people had gathered at the opening night of Benvenuti's show, admiring his artwork. The pieces in this, his first show as a featured artist, reflect a new path for Benvenuti, who once focused more on cartoons. Gallery-goers instead admired detailed figures, animals, birds and objects drawn in pencil, pen-and-ink and paint.



There is humanity in his work. Benvenuti clearly sees nuance in his subject and translates it from his mind's eye, to pen, to paper. It was a proud and almost overwhelming event for Benvenuti, who has been creating art since grade school.

"I've always really liked art," he said. "Now I'm exploring more, using different mediums like pen and ink, pencil, charcoal, acrylics and pastel chalk. I'm doing different kinds of art now."

Benvenuti is a longtime resident of DePaul programs currently living at Cornerstone, a DePaul Single Room Occupancy (SRO) program in Rochester, New York. He also attends the DePaul Personalized Recovery Oriented Services (PROS) program and is a regular at DePaul's Recreation Center.

"I've been with DePaul since 1989," he said. "The people at DePaul are always supportive and nice. They care about us."

He grew up in Irondequoit, New York and developed an early interest in drawing after observing a friend create cartoons with dialogue. Soon, Benvenuti was creating comic strips, which he does to this day. In high school his interest turned to drawing science-fiction characters. He fine-tuned his artistic expression, often copying book covers featuring characters such as Tarzan and Conan. In eleventh-grade, his hard work was rewarded with an honorable mention

for a portrait of Jimmy Page, the guitarist for Led Zeppelin, in an art show.

Benvenuti has also created posters and had his work selected for use as the cover of a holiday card for a local organization.

He still enjoys cartooning in single and multi-panel strips. He enters the original pieces in contests in various newspapers and periodicals. His month-long show at the Creative Wellness Coalition represents a new venue for expression.

"I love coming to the Creative

Wellness Coalition," Benvenuti said. "It has been about two years since I started and I look forward to the days that I attend. I have learned many new skills and have become more confident in my abilities as an artist. I keep thinking about other artists and where I can go with this. Encouragement and support from my peers and staff have made me want to work more at my art."

Art Educator at the Creative Wellness Coalition, Leslie Werlin, commented that Michael is "very focused on personal growth and that is reflected in his art." He continues to risk more, exploring various styles, colors and backgrounds.

"It was so moving to see him enjoy the impact his art has made. He's such a quiet, kind, gentle soul. The more he creates, the more he grows," Werlin added.

Veronica Weider, Director of the Creative Wellness Coalition, drove Benvenuti home after opening night, an evening that featured refreshments, soft music in the background and an opportunity to meet the artist and see his work. Seven of his pieces were purchased that evening. "This has been a transformational experience for Mike," said Weider.

"It was a memorable evening. I don't think I used any gas driving," said Weider. "We floated all the way home."

Charcholla Receives Mental Health Practitioner's Award




