It wasn't worth filing a

police report.

"It was two houses up and across the street," said Wilkie.

These types of incidents are not very common, according to Cpl. John Helfer of the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, but they do occur.



"It's an invasion of your privacy and your personal things," she said.


The Crowells filed a police report, but they have yet to see their belongings returned.
