
Wilterdink said staying active "nour-

Well known in Penfield for his 10-year stint on the Town Board, Peters, a retired Kodak researcher, has served on the town Planning Board, the town's Comprehensive Planning Committee and is a member of the Penfield Trails Committee and Ethics Committee.

Additionally, Peters and his wife Nancy embarked on a sixweek hiking trip in New Zealand this year. In 1994, they hiked to the bottom of the Grand Canyon and back up again. The pair also bike, hike and ski.
