After attending Morrisville College, she bred, raised and trained race horses in Mendon, some of which competed at the Finger Lakes Gaming & Racetrack.

As a child, she was also interested in architecture and interior design. Instead of asking for her parents to buy her a Barbie house, she used old shoe boxes to build her own. She added indoor plumbing and working ceiling fans to the house using plastic straws, popsicle sticks and some ingenuity.

In the 1980s, as an adult, Aser used her interest in architecture to design a barn for her horses. She also began doing interior-design consulting from her home studio.

Once she began ordering furniture for clients, she opened a furniture shop in Mendon, and then in the village of Pittsford, on State Street. She ran SPK Home Furnishings for about five years, before meeting the man of her dreams, Bob Aser. After they got married, Aser closed the business to start a family.

When she decided to get back to work, she landed a job as an interior designer for a local real estate company that dealt with new construction. There, she was encouraged to get her real estate license. She did, about six years ago. The rest is history.

She's been an agent with RE/MAX Realty Group for a little over two years. A resident of Brighton in the Penfield School District, Aser's son Owen attends Indian Landing. Her daughter Tyler will start kindergarten there in the fall.
